

In 1929 the library's collection grew to 1,000 volumes and needed more space so it was moved to the first floor of the Dairy Office on Page's Hill now Franklin Ave. Today it is known as the Stream Building next to the Van Allen House. The Oakland Historical Society currently has a restoration project underway to save this historic building.

This dairy office was one of the original buildings on the estate of Edward Page. During the 1920's the estate was owned by a Catholic Seminary which granted permission for the library to use the Stream Bldg.

In 1929 the Borough provided \$100 to support the library and paid the librarian \$10 a month. The library also received funds from contributions, social events and book rental fees.

Ill health forced Mrs. Hopper to give up the post of town librarian shortly after this move. Mrs. Henry P. Demerest became the librarian and in June 1932 the library was moved to her home at 277 Ramapo Valley Road (currently the home of the Bill Potash family). The Library Board paid \$15 a month to use space in the house.

In 1930 Mayor Peter Demarest appointed the first library board trustees: Mrs. Henry Demarest
