Kevin Heffernan Mike,

Please permit me to expand upon my initial thoughts for the post in addition to commenting upon related comments.

First, with regard to sentimentality towards Native Americans, the Dutch founders hated them. It's a documented fact and the Dutch fought and lost 2 wars against the Lenni Lenape Indians. And besides, half with a smile, no Native American ever strolled through Pleasureland. :)) Additionally, there haven't been any Indians in or around Oakland since 1758 when they were shipped off to a reservation in the Pine Barrons. The reservation, ironically called Brotherton, was a very un-brotherly place.

Second, while many people are aware of Mullers and many remember it, everyone knows about Pleasureland. And thousands has very fond memories of it.

Third, the fact that Pleasureland comprises only 1/3 of the proposed park is, judgmentally, not a consideration as that entire area of town is simply known as Pleasureland - by all! Not many could tell you where Mullers was with precision.

Fourth, to avoid naming the park Pleasureland Park because of the tragedy there in 1984 having the potential to evoke bad memories may be a bit over the top. Yes, people remember it. But people remember far more the wonderful times, smells and events of Pleasureland and indeed treasure them. To have this as a reason to not name it Pleasureland Park is to also say that the bad guys won. Nope.

And finally, the proposed name, Pleasureland Park preserves an important aspect of Oakland history in a way that Great Oak Park, with all due respect, utterly fails to do. Further, the naming of paths and the keeping of foundations evocative of Pleasureland appears to be entirely too subtle.

To the extent that this posted question to name the proposed park Pleasureland Park has received such an overwhelming positive response, I truly think that the many strong voices here and on other Facebook pages ought to be heard. And I sincerely hope that you will listen to them.

Bob Morse Muller's Park shootout[edit]

On August 4, 1985, a gun shootout occurred at the FRG Sports Complex[18] — formerly known

as Muller's Park — directly next to Oakland's former swimming park located along the Ramapo River called Pleasureland.[19] Some time around 4:30 p.m. gunfire between rival Jamaican gangs, who were bused-in from out of town, broke out resulting in two deaths and a number of injuries.[20] Before the incident, Pleasureland and Muller's Park were popular summer destinations that had since the 1950s and earlier (Muller's was built in 1935) attracted families from across the Tri-state area. Pleasureland remained open for a brief period after the shooting incident at FRG, but FRG/Muller's Park never reopened after that day.[21] While the shootout did not occur at Pleasureland, due to the park's popularity the events remain to this day known as the "Pleasureland Shootout" and "Pleasureland Massacre" among townies. Both properties currently remain abandoned,the pools and buildings having since been demolished and filled in. The properties still remain vacant.
